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Partha Dasgupta taught at the London School of Economics from 1971-84 before moving to the University of Cambridge in 1985 as Professor of Economics. From 1989-92 he was Professor of Economics, Professor of Philosophy, and Director of the Program in Ethics in Society at Stanford University; and from 1991-97 he served as Chairman of the (Scientific Advisory) Board of the Beijer International Institute of Ecological Economics, Stockholm.

Dasgupta's research interests include welfare and development economics, the economics of technological change; population, environmental; and resource economics, game theory; and the economics of undernutrition. Publications include Guidelines for Project Evaluation (with S.A. Marglin and A.K. Sen; UN 1972), Economic Theory and Exhaustible Resources (with G.M. Heal; Cambridge University Press 1979; The Control of Resources (Harvard University Press 1982); An Inquiry into Well-Being and Destitution (Clarendon Press, Oxford, 1993); Human Well-Being and the Natural Environment (Oxford University Press, 2001; revised edition, 2004); and Economics: A Very Short Introduction (Oxford University Press 2007).

Dasgupta is a Fellow of the Econometric Society (1975), Fellow of the British Academy (1989), Fellow of the Royal Society (2004), Member of the Pontifical Academy of Social Sciences (1998), Fellow of the Third World Academy of Sciences (2001), Foreign Member of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences (1991), Honorary Fellow of the London School of Economics (1995), Honorary Member of the American Economic Association (1997), Foreign Honorary Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (1991), Foreign Associate of the US National Academy of Sciences (2001), and Foreign Member of the American Philosophical Society (2005). He is a past President of the Royal Economic Society (1998-2001), the European Economic Association (1999). He was named Knight Bachelor by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 2002.
